


## **TO HOPE AND ACT WITH CREATION** SEASON OF CREATION 2024

## Theme

The theme for 2024 is "To hope and act with Creation" and the symbol is "The first fruits of hope", inspired by Romans 8:19-25.

The selected text explains the significance of capitalizing the word "Creation" in this year's theme. It emphasizes that "Creation" is not just an object for human use but a subject that invites engagement and co-operation. The capitalized term signifies both the tangible world and the ongoing creative process of God, acknowledging the entire cosmos and highlighting our interconnectedness and responsibility towards the natural world. This approach reflects respect and reverence for the natural world.

## Papal message for Creation Day: *Hope and Act with Creation*

he papal message is entitled "Hope and Act with Creation," and in it, Pope Francis reminds us that "Hoping and acting with creation means first of all joining forces and walking together with all men and women of good will." In this moment of struggle for our common home, we are united. We join together with our sisters and brothers throughout the world in common purpose.

But hope is not the end of the story. We are also called to action. Pope Francis tells us that the Holy Spirit "keeps the believing community alert and continually instructs them, calls them to conversion in lifestyles, to resist human degradation of the environment."

Believing in a better future means taking action to bring it to life. We respond to Pope Francis' message with hope, prayer, and action.

Reflection for the Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time, September 1st 2024

#### FIRST SUNDAY OF THE SEASON OF CREATION

It is very easy to take our natural world for granted. We see nature all around us, but do we really see it?

The whole cycle of life & creation is in our seasons – waiting, being fully alive, decline and death – a mirror of our own lives.

There is a whole world out there, not so different to us and our life cycle. Look at the birds of the air and fish of the sea which do not worry about what they have to eat or where to live. They are provided for since creation began, and we too were promised that we would be looked after. We only have real difficulties when those with more than they need do not share with those who do not have enough to survive.

The Global North has an abundance of food and wealth while in other parts of the world people are starving and living in poverty – an imbalance in our shared world due to greed. War was never part of Creation; everyone had an equal share at birth, but their place of birth may determine the share of earth's abundance that some people receive. Greed creates difficulties in our natural world where rain forests are cut down and land is used for industrialisation in an unbalanced way.

We must come back to the realisation that earth / nature is a gift to use and enjoy, not to abuse.

Human life is only one form of life on this earth. We must respect and live in harmony with all other forms of life that have been created – forests, birds of the air, fish of the seas and all other living creatures – and that we are blessed to have on our temporary home, called earth. (God's creation)

#### SECOND SUNDAY OF THE SEASON OF CREATION

#### Ephphata (Be opened).

The man who can't hear and can't speak hears and speaks in today's Gospel.

As we begin our second week of the Season of Creation, we too seek to hear and speak of the Creation of God who has made us in God's own image and likeness and shared with us the entire beauty of Creation of which we are a part. This year the theme of the Season is: To Hope and Act in Creation.

We have been celebrating the Season of Creation for 35 years now. This wonderful ecumenical event brings together Christian churches throughout the world in this time of prayer and action of all Christians. It is the Eastern Orthodox Church Patriarch Demetrios of Constantinople who declared the 1st of September the Feast of Creation. This celebration was extended to the feast of Francis of Assisi on October 4th with the participation of the World Council of Churches, Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Methodists, Lutherans and other denominations and many Christian organisations throughout the world. This makes it one of the great ecumenical events of the year.

To hear and to speak are the fruits of the healing in the gospel today. It is a sign of what the Lord wishes us to do in living in and as a part of Creation. To listen and hear what Creation is saying to us: its' growth and development, its' 'pain' in its' destruction. Likewise, to listen and hear the Word of God in our lives both written and other aspects of our life.

We can celebrate the concrete, gains that occur as we also perceive the faults. In 2023 in Ireland the greenhouse gas emissions were reduced by 6.8%. While falling short of our more ambitious target it is a good signpost for the future. Public transport has also notably improved with the addition of new routes and timetables in the Dublin area and elsewhere. There are so many community and individual initiatives. In the Catholic tradition there is the aim of making 30% of church grounds natural habitats. Smaller projects are to be seen in so many places. Small and large initiatives complement each other.

Let us continue to hope and act in Creation.....

There is a short refrain attached to capture the spirit of this movement - (Ephphata is an Aramaic word, Jesus' native language, meaning Be opened).

Ephphata – Be Opened Ephphata, ephphata, be opened says the Lord Ephphata, ephphata be healed. Ephphata, ephphata Jesus says to me. I can hear, I can speak, I can sing.


#### THIRD SUNDAY OF THE SEASON OF CREATION

e can see someone every day and still not know them. Getting to know someone is an ongoing work of love, wonder and patience. The disciples are attracted to Jesus as a powerful figure who heals and leads. Jesus asks, "Who do people say that I am?" Peter digs deep and says "You are the Messiah". Jesus invites the disciples to understand more about himself. Jesus is not just a powerful figure who heals and does wonders. He is a powerful figure who suffers the consequences of his confrontations with the Jewish authorities and Rome.

Saint Augustine in his Sermon on the Shepherds wrote "A Christian's strength includes not only doing what is good, but also enduring what is evil." Jesus takes us the way of truth and vulnerable love in a conflict-ridden world.

In this month too, we ask "What is creation? We can be attracted to its beauty and see also a beauty that is damaged. As with each person, as with Jesus, so too with creation we are faced with a mystery that is unfolding in a landscape of crime and hope.

#### FOURTH SUNDAY OF THE SEASON OF CREATION

t the beginning of this reflection get into a comfortable position so that your whole person is open to the Divine within and around you. Become aware of your breathing as it enters your nostrils and exits through your mouth, do this three times, then become aware of your tummy as you fill it with air, like a big balloon and let go again, now fill your lungs with air and let it go again. Do this slowly once again, filling your tummy and then your lungs. See which is the strongest area and stay with this as your anchor for a few more seconds.

During this Season of Creation, Christians are invited to think more deeply about what is happening to the earth and to be advocates for the common good in numerous ways.


#### A Visualisation using the Senses.

Whether you grew up in the city or countryside most of us have a memory of either being close to nature whether it was for picking blackberries or being near a meadow that was soon to be harvested.

I want you to picture a setting close to hills as you enter a meadow. The grasses invite you to lie down in their midst. As you stretch out on the soft ground you enter a world which is now taller than yourself with buttercups, pink clover, scabious and a swath of different grasses. You look up at the blue sky through this a greenish haze and fill your lungs with the fresh air and smells of the grasses as you enjoy the sounds of birdsong and the grasshopper which is more audible. You enjoy this peaceful colourful scene for a few more minutes and watch the clouds as they float by. You are slowly woken out of your reveille. Make a prayer that your heart may be open to the natural beauty of this world as it was when you were a little child. Welcome Christ anew who welcomes little children and what they can teach us.

#### FIFTH SUNDAY OF THE SEASON OF CREATION

n today's gospel, the disciples are too busy with their own plans for the future & so are unable to hear the critical message Jesus is giving, even when he speaks of his own life being threatened. He concludes by asking the disciples to be attentive to the "little ones." We too can be busy with our plans, so busy as not to notice what is happening all around us; where life is threatened, where the "little" ones are being threatened. Several times Jesus speaks of having ears and not hearing.

The Earth our only home is in great danger and needing our attention. Pope Francis has been speaking for many months calling us care for the Earth, God's gift to us all. We realise that more must be done to save our earth for ourselves and future generations, but we find it hard to commit; to do what is required. The challenge is there- to listen to God's call today.

Listen to the Earth – (Adapted from poem by Sr Leonor de la Santa)

Listen to the Earth; our Common Home it's in danger now.

Tune into God's creation; God is speaking now.

Listen to the rain, listen to the sea, listen to the thunder & wind listen to the birds as they sing.

Listen to the flowers & trees; each creature has a story, the love of God they sing.

Listen to the poor, they suffer more.

Reflection for the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi, October 4th 2024

#### FEAST DAY OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

There are many reasons for hope; creation and the challenges it is facing are now very much on many people's radar; the inspiring life and actions of St Francis of Assisi, who lived 800 years ago and whose Feast Day is today, still hold much sway and inspire many Christian denominations. We can also find hope and rejoice in the enthralling phrase that Mark gives in the final paragraph of next Sunday's Gospel passage. "I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the Kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it".

We are invited to enter and enjoy creation with the wonder and curiosity of a child. The moments when we can do this are to be held and treasured, and are vital nourishment for our journey.

The challenges to care for and act with creation get louder. We are aware of this ever more in the realities of daily life. What may appear to be the simple activity of shopping for basic foodstuffs can become a very challenging task. How can we shop with respect for creation and our fellow humans? We try to choose wrapping that is minimal and biodegradable. This is far from easy. There is a growing body of persuasive evidence that buying plant-based foods rather than meats is better for creation. Strongly held beliefs and practices are under pressure.

As we come to the conclusion of the celebration of the Season of Creation, we give praise and thanks to the Creator. To assist us let us draw on some lines in the prayer gifted to us by Pope Francis at the conclusion of Laudato Si':

- Triune Lord, wondrous community of infinite love,
- teach us to contemplate you
- in the beauty of the universe,
- for all things speak of you.
- Awaken our praise and thankfulness
- for every being that you have made.
- Give us the grace to feel profoundly joined
- to everything that is.

### LITURGICAL RESOURCES

#### How to incorporate the symbol in your events and celebrations

#### Activities

- Organise an encounter to introduce this year's Season of Creation theme and symbol. Briefly introduce and explain the theme and symbol, then dedicate a few minutes to open dialogue or small group discussions so people can share how they feel about the theme and symbol and what activities they would like to organise during the season.
- At Eucharist, hold a procession of thanksgiving for the fruits of the Earth from your local area, inviting a diversity of people to help bring these gifts to the table: different ages, different races, different genders.
- Distribute seeds that are easy to grow and cultivate where you live and see if your community or local school can offer these seeds to others. You can incorporate this at the end of a prayer service, offering some reflection on how we are all called to bear the first fruits of hope, and commit to check on how these seeds have grown by the time of next year's Season of Creation.

All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures. You embrace with your tenderness all that exists. Pour out upon us the power of your love, that we may protect life and beauty. Fill us with peace, that we may live as brothers and sisters, harming no one. O God of the poor, help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this earth, so precious in your eyes. Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it, that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction. Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain at the expense of the poor and the earth. Teach us to discover the worth of each thing, to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognize that we are profoundly united with every creature as we journey towards your infinite light. We thank you for being with us each day. Encourage us, we pray, in our struggle for justice, love and peace.

#### THANKSGIVING FOR THE EARTH

God of Holy Dreaming, great Creator Spirit, from the dawn of Creation you have given your children the good things of our mothering Earth.
